Frank Haas – "Adak – Gambling on Birds"

ur October program will be given by Frank Haas. Frank is a long-time birder and has been active in the birding community for many years. He and his wife, Barb, began "Pennsylvania Birds" magazine and Frank was Chief Editor of the journal from 1986 to 2000.

Frank and Barb recently published the Second Edition of an "Annotated List of the Birds of Pennsylvania" and in 2005, Frank and Roger Burrows published "Birds of Pennsylvania", a guide to birds and bird finding in the Commonwealth. Both publications will be available for purchase.

The program is titled "Adak - Gambling on Birds" and includes a brief history of the island along with a look at the birdlife and other wildlife observed during trips to this Aleutian outpost located 1,300 miles southwest of Anchorage, Alaska.



Field Trips Allegheny Front Hawk Watch

Jerry Stanley has agreed to join us at Allegheny Front to assist in hawk identification and generally help us get the most from the trip. This year we will meet at the parking lot at the Hawk Watch. You can arrive and leave anytime you wish; I will probably get there about 9:30 AM on Thursday and leave mid-afternoon on Friday. The trip takes about 2.5 hours from Clarion.

The parking lot at Allegheny Front is small so please consider car pooling with someone whose plans correspond with yours.

Some of us plan to stay overnight at the Shawnee, the phone number is 814-733-2828; prices are \$45 to \$47 (same as last year), depending upon the number of people and beds. The McGuires have experience with a motor-home site near Shellsburg; talk to them if you would like to try that option. We will probably go to the Jean Bonnet Restaurant about 5 miles east of Shellsburg on Thursday evening. The convenience store next to the motel opens at 7:30 AM, but the fresh donuts are often not done until 8:00.

The weather can be severe on the Allegheny Front and it can change quickly. We have had snow, intense fog, rain and wind, but most folks say that bad weather and good hawk watching go hand in hand! Since we hope to see lots of hawks, be sure to put your warmest and most water-repellent clothes in the car.

Two hundred red tails and a dozen golden eagles in a day at Allegheny Hawk Watch is not unusual. This trip is always an unpredictable adventure. It has always been fun. I hope you can join us.

Direction - From Clarion:

Take Route 66 South to Route 422; then take 422 East to Route 219 (just west of Edensburg). Go south on Route 219 to Route 56. Route 56 East will take you to Route 160. Take Route 160 to Central City. In Central City, Route 160 turns sharply Right. Don't follow. Go straight on Main Street 0.4 mi to T on Shaffer Mt Road. Turn left. Go one mile to first Right, which is Lambert Mt. Road. Follow Lambert three miles to "crossroad" where the main road goes left continue straight ahead for ½ mile to a driveway with a blue gate on the right. Follow the driveway to the parking lot.

Thirty-five people gathered mushrooms for about 40 minutes, filling bags and baskets with samples. Scott then went to work identifying at least 46 varieties, adding interesting facts about their taste, smell, texture, and color while Pam labeled the samples by scientific and common names. Clarion County Compiler

many of you know, Margaret Buckwalter has been the Clarion County Compiler for *Pennsylvania Birds*, the Journal of the Pennsylvania Society for Ornithology, for many years. This quarterly publication includes a report from each county, photographic highlights, and interesting articles concerning birding in Pennsylvania. Reports are published on the Winter Raptor Survey, the PA Migration Count, and the Christmas Bird Counts. Formerly Pennsylvania Birds also included "Seasonal Occurrence Tables", a record of species abundance per county per quarter - these are still reported by each county compiler, but are now published only on the PSO web site, www.pabirds.org, to save printing costs. Pennsylvania Birds is written and edited entirely by volunteers.



Seasonal Pools Project

The following request/information about an interesting new citizen science project was received from Sally Ray of the Western PA Conservancy.

I am contacting you to ask for your help with a new statewide initiative within the Pennsylvania Natural Heritage Program. It is the Pennsylvania Seasonal Pools Project. Seasonal (or vernal) pools provide important habitat for a number of amphibian and invertebrate species. Other animals utilize and depend upon them as well. This is an effort to identify and map the locations of these pools statewide.

This registry is a citizen-scientist program. We are seeking contact with groups and organizations that may have members who would be willing to help identify and register seasonal pools. Public involvement is a way to maximize our resources. Getting information about known locations of pools can provide a great deal of information rapidly and can help us target areas that need further inventory. The information collected will help us characterize the plants and animals that depend on seasonal pools and examine patterns of regional variation or rarity. Ultimately, we hope that the information collected will be used to drive planning and conservation efforts in areas supporting these important wetlands.

We have developed a website to inform the general public about the project and have brochures available for distribution describing the project. You can view the Pennsylvania Seasonal Pools website at: http://www.paconserve.org/rc/sp/.

We are currently engaged in various outreach projects such as presentations and workshops to provide information on the Seasonal Pools Project. We are also looking for opportunities to team up or partner with other groups in doing these workshops and presentations. If your group is interested, please contact me so that we can discuss ways that we might work together or schedule a program for your organization. I look forward to hearing from you.
